Improvisation

No script? No problem! Improvisation is an invaluable skill. Thinking on your feet, saying "yes," and active listening with your acting partner are all skills that you will "play" hard at honing over this unit. Through myriad improv games, we will strengthen our ability to accept offers, add on new information, and tell a coherent story--- while making it up on the spot! We will concentrate on building a platform (character, relationship, environment, conflict) and listening to our scene partners as our specific skills to practice each session. We will culminate the unit by inviting other Galloway teachers as a small audience--taking their suggestions for characters or environments---and going with the flow.

General Theater Skills:

Throughout the whole term, we will continue to strengthen the practice of being a theatrical ensemble. By working together, students will develop a common language and trust in the group. Each student will be responsible for contributing his or her own creative ideas to the group, and also responsible for supporting the group as a whole. Students will strengthen their voices—both projection and articulation, and will increase their awareness of their physicality and their stage presence.

Essential Questions

What are the elements of improvisation?

What makes improv different from scripted theater?

How will you establish character, relationship, environment, and story with no rehearsal or planning?

How will you practice your listening and observation skills in class and outside of school? What are all the ways you can say "yes" to your acting partner onstage in a scene? How can we make strong choices onstage that are creative and clear? How do different professional organizations/theaters use improvisation differently?

How do different professional organizations/theaters use improvisation differently? How is improvisation useful in life outside of the theater? (Applications in "real world")
